This application will be handed over asap to the Colombian Institue for Agricultural Development. INCODER, also known from the fish pond project. For this

Because of administrative and logistic circumstances, the fish came from Bogotá by airplane. To avoid oxigen shortage, the bags had to be transferred to San Martin with a speedboot. After sunset, they could finally be freed. In about nine months, hopefully they can be harvested big and fat!

During the months of June and July, Sanne Buursma from Baarle was visiting San Martin de Amacayacu to experience local and all different Small World life Foundation projects. Sanne: "At the moment of writing, I have already been in San Martin for four weeks. It is incredible how time flies! I was received with open arms and since then, each day has been special and brings something new. Bit by bit, I learn about daily life in San Martin: The many bird sounds, delicious tropical fruits, harvesting crops, cooking on fire, washing and bathing in the river, and much more. It is interesting that I find these activities more and more 'normal' as time goes by, even though I would never have



imagined myself planting pineapple or harvesting yucca in the Amazon. Every once in a while, we laugh at my silly remarks as a westerner. In the meantime, I have played many card and board games in the house where I live. With the many drawings the kids made for me, I could cover the walls of a complete room!

And of course, one can not stay in San Martin without trying the famous masato (alcoholic drink made from yucca). About the Small World Foundation projects, I could not have picked a better moment: During my stay, several toilets were installed, the baby fish were freed in the ponds and inportante milestones were achieved concerning the ancestral land application. At this moment, we are brainstorming about the remodulation of San Martin's kindergarden, to which I hope to contribute as well. In short: Many exciting developments!!
