

INCODER VISIT


For San Martin de Amacayacu and Palmeras, the first week of July 2013 totally revolved around the community visit by the INCODER team as a result of the application for official land recognition by the two communities. The INCODER team consisted of two anthropologists, two geographers and a legal advisor. Given the size of the ancestral lands, only the crucial parts of the limits were reviewed in the forest, and not the whole area. Two teams went to the rainforest for three days. In the meantime, the anthrologists conducted the socioeconomic study. For this, the people's and agricultural plots were visited interviews were held. During one day, a specific meeting was held with the Amacayacu National Park staff. There were some important discussions on this day and compromises had to be accepted to avoid risking the aim of the visit. The southeast corner of the applied area, where the Amacavacu National Park facilities are located, will not be included in the new indigenous reserve, but in turn an extra piece of land will be added in the northeast corner. Additionally, the legal advisor's concept is that the areas A and B cannot be included in the new reserve, as they are already part of the existing Tikuna Cocama and Yagua (TICOYA) indigenous reserve. However, the continous abuse of the natural resources in these areas as a result of a lack of good governance in this reserve has been the most important argument for San Martin to claim an independent status... The fate of these two areas will surely return in the meetings which will follow up on the INCODER visit!

REGULATING THE TIKUNA, COCAMA AND YAGUA INDIGENOUS RESERVE

In the tenth month after the project started elaborating the regulations for the Tikuna Cocama and Yagua indigenous reserve, it was time for presentation. The digital document could be presented on the big screen and analysed article by article (109 in total!) during the "Wone Congress". This is the name for the event whereby at least 20 representatives of each of the 22 communities gather and take decisions for the reserve. Such an event requires quite an organisation in terms of food, lodging and transport for the hundreds of participants. Fortunately, the project provided sufficient funds (from the Colombian Ministries of Justice and of Interior Affairs) and everything went Representatives smoothly. of the Colombian National Indigenous Organisation (ONIC) also took part in the event for a day.

We keep mentioning this project in this Foundation Small World newsletter because our volunteer Heike van Gils has been actively involved from the start. Also, some extra project costs were covered with funds from "our jar". Eventually, we hope that a better TICOYA indigenous reserve governance leads to a better management of nature and people in the whole area. In particular, this would be positive news for San Martin's ancestral area, where a lot of natural resources are found. At the ' Wone Congress', Heike van Gils was considered as a natural part of the discussions and each time her contributions were heard with great attention. A special experience!
