Appeal from the Amazon Rainforest!

Q: What do water tanks and boats have to do with monkeys?

Q: What do water tanks and boats have to do with monkeys?
A: A lot more thank you might think!
San Martin is a Tikuna indigenous community based in the heart of the Colombian Amazon. It has a population of around 450 people and access to and from the community is by river only. Sharing the rainforest with the Tikuna people are a plethora of plants and animals, including woolly and capuchin monkeys, who also make their home in the Amazon basin. The Tikunas hold an invaluable depth of knowledge about the conservation of the rainforest and about sustainable and low-impact living that has been passed down from generation. generation. At Wild Futures our aim is to protect primates and habitats worldwide and we strongly believe that, by supporting the people that live in the forest, we support the conservation of the forest as a whole.

At present, the majority of families in the community do not have access to clean drinking water and, as a result, there is a high occurrence of related illness—particularly in youngsters and the elderly. The nearest secondary there is a high occurrence of related illness—particularly in youngsters and the elderly. The nearest secondary school is located a half an hour boat ride away. The community has just one large boat which means that access to schooling is extremely limited, emergency transport to hospital is often not possible and the one boat available is often dangerously overloaded when community members need to attend important events.

We take clean water and access to education and emergency services for granted in the UK. The provision of water tanks and a new boat will make a huge difference to the people of San Martin and costs just £6,500.
